My sister and I went to two of Ed Zimmer's tours last week. One was to Wyuka Cemetary and on through the historical Hawley neighborhood. Both were very interesting. Ed has such a wealth of knowledge about everything. It was very hot on both days but his stories made you forget the heat.

My dear friend Sheryl Heidenreich died in May. She was such a special person and like me she had a deep love of our German heritage and was proud to be a little "German Rooshin." Our friendship deepened by the fact that I own the house that her father grew up in. When she and her mother came to Lincoln we would gather here and have a good visit. One year we had the cousins and aunts and uncles here for an afternoon of memory sharing. I miss her e-mails and phone calls.

My sister and I are both members of Immanuel Church on 10th and Charleston. Recently we had an old-time remembrance of a German Sunday service. The women sat on one side of the church and the men on the other. Songs were sung in German and stories were told. Those times of our kin folks were remembered and our old ways were once again shared and treasured.

Our ancestors were strong people and we should never forget the old country and the old ways. I am really proud to be a German-Russian on both sides of my family. I love my little German house on 8th and "Y" streets and all of its' history. I am proud that it is still well kept and if my ancestors walked in today they would feel at home.

Grampa Dellos would say we are lucky to be in America. He would be proud to be a citizen here. They remembered the old country, but loved the new country in America.

'So Earnest, Yet So Gay'

My grandmother, Marie (Meisinger) Dittenber, arrived in Lincoln in 1921 at the age of 15. From the age of sixteen until she was 32 she worked at the Rudge and Guenzel's Cafeteria downtown on 13th Street. A German-Russian immigrant who arrived in this country in 1909, she remembered those occasions when she took the streetcar to work downtown from her mother's home on A Street in the South Bottoms area of Lincoln. She spoke with fond memories of Rudge and Guenzel, her job at the steam table and the many friends and acquaintances gathered through sixteen years working there. She seemed particularly to enjoy the bustle of the different peoples that frequented Rudge and Guenzel.

Apparently, one of the frequent patrons of Rudge and Guenzel's was Marie Macumber, best known today as Mari Sandoz. As Jim McKee related in a July 1996 article on Sandoz in the Lincoln paper, Sandoz, like my grandmother, was also a recent arrival to Lincoln. During the decade of the 1920's Mari Sandoz attended UNL, working in various capacities at the university.

Exactly what sparked a friendship between the erstwhile writer and my grandmother is difficult to say. Though a full decade older than my grandmother, the two Maries shared several commonalities; German spoken at home, educations terminated with 8th grade, and harsh – yes, even abusive – fathers. Whatever the source of their friendship, Sandoz proudly presented a first edition of *Old Jules* upon its publication in 1935. Sandoz captured the essence of my grandmother and the spirit of these young immigrant women from that era, in a simple, yet moving inscription.

"To Marie Meisinger, because she is so earnest, and yet so gay too, like no one else on earth – Mari Sandoz"





Bunnock™: The German-Russian Game for All Ages

The game of Bunnock was originally brought to Canada and the United States by German-Russian immigrants in the early 1900's. It is a game played with the horse ankle bones and was set up with a few bones that could be gathered from the dead horses the farming families had around. Some say the game was originally played in a circle with the competitors standing in the middle throwing outward at the circle of bones.

Bunnock is a fun game that can be played by two to eight players or more. Two rows of 22 bones are set up about 10 meters (32 feet 10 inches) apart with one guard at either end, 40cm (16") apart. The object of the game is to be the first to knock down the guards (black bones) then the inside soldiers (white bones), before the other team. Each player throws two bones each with the first team to throw to be decided by a coin toss. The first team to knock down their opponents Bunnock with the least amount of throws will win the game.



Your Lincoln Chapter continues to promote our heritage by demonstrating and playing Bunnock at community events we are involved in, such as the Lincoln Children's Museum, Havelock Fall Festival, and Nebraska 150 Celebration. Look for us to run more Bunnock events in the future.


