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Good GR Home Cooking

This has been a cold and snowy March. I remember being a grade-schooler in the late 1940's. We had a lot of snow then also. Trains were stuck in the deep snow and the air force had to drop supplies and hay onto farm and ranch fields. People were stuck in their cars on undrivable roads. Thankfully, diners and farm homes took in stranded travelers.

I even remember the National Guard delivering mail. Winters of my youth seemed colder and had more snow then. My grampa Bridegam walked miles cleaning the ice off the train tracks.

But I also remember the hot homemade pots of soup we had for our dinners at home. Our mother, Hilda Bridegam, could make the best foods. They were simple and delicious. Her fried chicken was better than any restaurant in Lincoln. She used an old cast iron skillet and lard to fry it in. It was golden brown and crispy.

She made mashed potatoes, with a hand masher, that were fluffy without lumps. She also had the best gravies that were thick, also without lumps. She used just hot potato water and flour, which she had mixed with water to smooth it into her hot chicken drippings and grease. She would put her stove fire on low and keep adding her flour and hot water until she had the skillet almost full. She then added her salt. We had enough gravy for dinner and had enough left over for the next day with toast or plain bread for our lunch.

Us kids all loved gravy and toast. She made this with any left-over meats and gravy. I think I make good gravy but my mom's was delicious.

She liked to try new recopies. She listened to station KFOR on her kitchen radio and would try meals that sounded good to her. On Sundays we always had a dessert with our big meal of the day.

I remember this one Sunday my mother had bought a watermelon and when she cut into it, it had gone bad so she sent my dad to the basement to get some canned peaches. Those peaches had popped their lid, so her last choice was a cake she had baked.

Now, my mom baked from scratch and always made two-layered cakes. For some unknown reason one of the layers would always crack. Us kids did not care as this meant more frosting was used to glue it together, but my dad would always call them "Hilda's Grand Canyon Cakes."

The cakes would not win a blue ribbon at the state fair but they tasted good. What would win a ribbon were her oatmeal cookies and chocolate drop cookies. Also special were her cream pies with black cherries, and her banana cream pies. Ummm . . . good.

My mother's soups were really good, as well. She rolled out her own noodles and dried them on white tea towels on the dining room table. She used an old hen chicken for her broth and then stuffed it with dressing. After her broth was made she baked the chicken with potatoes, carrots, and onion slices in the oven until it was golden grown. She served this with bowls of her noodle soup.

We ate good, simple food at Hilda's table. We also never ate a meal where we did not have guests to share it with. Family and friends came – and never left hungry. We did not have a phone for years so our guests just knew we ate at 5:00 sharp.

Those were sweet days. Mocks Goot.


