Continuing our thumb nail sketch of persons with members of The American Historical Society of Germans from Russia (We have two new personality sketches who are members of the Staff and then will continue with our Society's local members as well as members of the International Board of AHSGR)

KIMBERLY SCHEETT

Kimberly was born in St. Paul, Minnesota on March 28, 1969 to Graham and Betty (Salmon) Kairies
Her father now lives in St. Paul and her mother in Pequot Lakes, Minnesota, which is about three hours away from
St. Paul.

Kimberly graduated from Pequot Lakes High School in 1987. While in high school she spent three months under an exchange student program in a small community near Stuttgart, Germany. Her German counterpart family had a daughter who came and lived with Kimberly and her mother, for three months under this same student exchange program, and when she went home, Kimberly went over to Germany to live with that German family.

She spent the next four years at North Dakota State University, located in Fargo, ND, graduating in 1992. While here she spent one year in Wuerzburg, Germany, where she studied at the Universitaet Wuerzburg.

One of her professors at NDSU was Dr. Tim Kloberdanz, who taught a class on Germans from Russia. She says she took the class primarily to find out more about her future husbands roots.

When the class was about to finish, all 40 members of the class were asked to bring a German-Russian dish. Kimberly said, "Every person brought enough food to feed all 40 people. All the dishes were German-Russian, with my Norwegian background, I brought Lefsa".

Another of her classes was "Great Plains" taught by Dr. Wm. Sherman He is one of the authors of "Plain Folks". She did a report for him on some German dialects, that the German Russians had.

On July 10, 1992 she and Dale Scheett were married, in Grand Fork, ND.

Dale is from Grand Forks, N. D. His grandparents came to North Dakota from Odessa, Russia, and settled near Rugby, ND. Dale's father went to school in the Rugby area too.

Dale has a degree from NDSU in Philosophy and Humanities. For the past year and a half, he has been working at Tabitha Home, as a Resident Assistant. His goal is to go into Gerontology, and work in Social Services for the elderly. At the present time he is also attending Southeast Community College to get an Associate Degree.

Coming to Lincoln, Kimberly attended the University of Nebraska - Lincoln, to get her Master's Degree. While she attended UNL she was a Graduate Teaching Assistant, teaching German.

She will receive her Masters Degree in German Literature and Linguistics, with a French Minor in December, 1995.

She teaches German 101 at Union College.

Union College has a small department of Foreign languages in the Humanities Department.

Kimberly tells the story of how she came to go to work for AHSGR:

Dale's family came to Lincoln a couple of months ago. Both Dale and Kimberly had been living here in Lincoln for three years; but had never come to the Museum. Here was a golden opportunity! During the tour Kimberly mentioned she was to receive her Master's in German and had taken a class under Dr. Kloberdanz. Kay Koch, who was conducting the tour, looked at the registration sheet, and said she was sorry that they were from North Dakota, as there was a job opportunity with the Society. Dale had written down his parents name as being from North Dakota. Kimberly responded that they did live in Lincoln. Within seconds Kay asked, 'Would you like a job? We are open tomorrow. (Saturday). Bring us your resume' Kay went to another office, called Sheila and they talked to Kimberly (both Mike Ronn and Sara Barr had left AHSGR just a few days before). As she had just taken her Master's Exam, she replied, "Yes", and on Tuesday she started to work at AHSGR.

Her father was attending Kearney State College, at the time of her birth, and as soon as he graduated the family returned to the family farm. Michelle grew up on the farm near Page, graduated from O'Neill High School in 1987.

While attending College, she received scholarships. I was active in Choir, Theater, and the Fine Art Club. My Irish Dancers class, helped me get a Fine Art Scholarship", Michelle said.

She graduated from College with a bachelor's degree in English Literature, and a minor in Psychology in 1991. She came to the University of Nebraska - Lincoln to get a Master's Degree in Education, attending from 1991 through January, 1994. At that time she decided, she really didn't want to be a teacher, took some time off, and began working at the Lincoln Public Library.

Michelle has one sister, Amy, 23, who graduated from Grinnell University at Grinnell, Iowa. At the present time she is attending Columbia University in New York City, to get her master's in Social Work.

Michelle says, "I was raised in a very Protestant Presbyterian culture, with both Irish and German enlightenment. My father's name is an old Anglo-Irish name, but my mother is a 3rd generation German American, so our home was endowed with both German and Anglo - Irish Ethnic Foods such as sauerkraut and head cheese along with Irish Potatoes, Corned beef and cabbage, and soda bread in our home".

Recently she started school again, in museum studies. Museum work is something I really want to become involved with. I want to become involved with three dimensional history, artifacts such antique jewelry, clothing and textiles. When I finish my current schooling (I already have some graduate hours), I will have a minor in Education and as a museum curator".

The position at AHSGR came at just about the same time as her going back to college. Michelle was acquainted with Sara Barr, who had been working at Headquarters, but had left to pursue another career. Sara talked to Michelle, telling her she felt Michelle would be a good asset for the Society, with her background. Michelle came to Headquarters, dropped off her resume` and was called in for an interview. She came to work the following week.
