

1125 South 6th Street, Lincoln

- · No prescriptions were sold.
- Sunflower seeds were roasted at home, packaged at the store, and sold for five cents a bag. Best in town!
- Huge one-cent candy display. Five cents would buy a big sack of goodies.
- Sold a few grocery items—similar to a Kwik Shop.
- Bottle of pop was five cents.
- Fresh, cubed yeast was five cents.
 It was purchased and eaten like candy.
- · Any age could buy tobacco.
- · Adam always had a cigar.

All of the fellows pictured in the upper right photograph came to the store at least once a day, usually early evening. During the summertime, time was spent on the front porch steps. During the wintertime, everyone crowded into a small area at the back of the store.
