
Broda Dinner Captured on Video

Diners at the November 7th AHSGR Broda Dinner, held at Lincoln's WSI Hall on North 10th Street, may have noticed an unusual addition to the festivities.

Folklorist Gwen Meister, Director of the Nebraska Folklife Network, and ideographer Mike Keating spent most of the day and part of the evening interviewing the cooks and documenting the preparation and serving of the traditional meal of oven-roasted beef and vegetables. Mike's daughter helped with the video and even got in on serving dinner. The videotape was being created for a traveling educational exhibit on cultural traditions of Nebraska's Germans from Russia that Meister is creating, with advice and assistance from AHSGR staff and volunteers. The trunk-sized traveling exhibit, called a cultural encounter kit, is funded by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts to the Nebraska Humanities Council (NHC). The NHC will circulate one copy of the kit to schools, libraries, museums, and other educational organizations throughout Nebraska. A second copy is slated to be housed at the Lincoln AHSGR headquarters for use in the organization's educational programs.

The Nebraska Folklife Network is a newly formed non-profit educational organization that is dedicated to documenting, preserving, and publicly presenting the many varieties of folk arts and cultural traditions that are found in Nebraska. The purpose of these activities is to help preserve these traditions for future generations and to promote increased understanding between cultural groups. The Network is a collaborative project between the Nebraska Humanities Council, the Nebraska Arts Council, and the Plains Humanities Alliance at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. It is also supported by the UNL College of Education and Human Science and the Nebraska State Historical Society. Pride in what has been accomplished to preserve that story and heritage. Bud and Virginia are not genealogists; they are preservers and storytellers.
