
conversation about whatever comes up among friends.

From the Kitchen: Guttessen! Good Eating!



Pigs in a Blanket—GR style

3 lbs. Hamburger

1 lb. Onion, coarsely chopped

1/2 lb. Rice, uncooked

1 or 2 #2-1/2 cans chopped tomatoes

Drain the tomatoes and reserve the liquid.

Peel 12 full leaves from the cabbage heads.

(May need more than one head.) Set aside.

Mix the hamburger, half of the chopped onion, uncooked rice, half of the drained tomatoes, salt and pepper together. Form scoops of the mixture into balls, wrap each ball with a cabbage leaf. Arrange the rolls in a large roaster pan. Put remaining onions and tomatoes over the rolls. Pour reserved tomato liquid over cabbage rolls. Sprinkle salt and pepper over all. Put into 350 degree oven for one hour, or until rice is completely cooked. Should make about 12 "pigs."


