

THE HUT

The hut was a two-room structure built deep within the high banks on the far side of the "Crabbing Pond," so named because it was loaded with crayfish, or crawdads. The Crabbing Pond was quite dirty and oily, and the long walk to the far side was made longer by the pond's swampy shore. Our young minds devised an ingenious plan: build a plank bridge! This not only got us across the pond in the least amount of time and through the least amount of muck, it also ensured our privacy; we could remove any section of the bridge, thus making it less likely that anyone would follow us.

The hut itself was made out of scrap lumber. The structure was braced so strongly that Budge Saurter, the farmer who farmed the land, plowed right over the top with his horses and never even knew we were right under him. The hut had all the conveniences of home, including a stove that allowed us to use the hut throughout the winter. We got housewares and such from the Goodwill. In those days, just after the Great Depression, money was scarce. But we could still go to the Goodwill store and pick up whatever the Goodwill tossed out. The prices were so low that even we could afford them with our pennies, nickels and dimes.

The hut was more than a pastime for us, more than a mere meeting place. It was a sanctuary from the adult world, a place where we could share our discontent with those who did not understand the angst of being a young boy. It took our minds off the fact that we did not have any toys, other than the toys we made ourselves, because our families did not have any money. It provided us with a distraction from the call of the street, a place where young boys grew up too fast—and

sometimes did not grow up at all.

Yes, we had guns. And rifles, and perhaps a thing or two that could be called a weapon by today's standards. But we did not use them against each other, and we would never have thought about taking them to school. We used them to kill rabbits, which we would cook and eat in the hut. Oftentimes this was accompanied by field corn and perhaps some cucumbers and tomatoes and potatoes that we happened to "find" lying about. These were often the best meals any of us had had in a while.

Some people will understand the attraction of the hut and get a kick out of such a young boy's adventures. Some will not and will think we were a bit goofy. My memories of the hut just make me wonder: Are we better off with all we have today, or were we better off in those days, when we had little more than an oily pond, a makeshift hut and each other?

Ed Schwartzkopf

Good-bye, Cuz.

Cuz, was sort of a joke between Ed Schwartzkopf and me. (I didn't call him, "Cuz" when he would thump me for doing something stupid at Lincoln High.)

Somewhere, in our families, one of my Grandfather Schenkel's sisters married a Schwartzkopf. Ed didn't know the genealogy, but his sister, Jean, did. (Jean passed away shortly before Ed.)

Ed was in on the very beginning of AHSGR. He, and others in Lincoln, would load up and go to Greeley, CO to help bring a fledgling dream to reality.

After the national organization of AHSGR was formed, Ed, and the same group of people, began traveling around the state to the areas with large Germans from Russia populations, starting up local chapters to help support the international organization.

Ed worked countless hours at the State Fair, along with those same incredible people, making and selling Volga Boatman sandwiches. Thousands of dollars were raised and donated to the building fund of the International Headquarters.

Ed not only gave of his time; he gave

his money, too. I remember that at one convention Ed pledged to pay the fifth installment (\$100) for anyone who came forward and signed up for a life membership. At that time the life membership fee was \$500. That "little" token cost Ed over \$6000 as over 60 people took advantage of his generous offer.

I don't know how long Ed served on the International Board of Trustees or on the National Board of Directors, but he always seemed to be on one or the other of those boards.

When I was first elected to the Lincoln Chapter Board of Directors, Ed was the president. He had been on the Board since it was chartered. I became president after Ed's term expired, not because we had a hot campaign, but more by default. Ed had been president for three years and, as is stated in the Lincoln Chapter by-laws, he could not be re-elected. Sort of "three strikes and you're out."

I could not have asked for more gracious footsteps to follow. Ed was always there to keep me from messing up.

Cuz, I'm going to miss your kind guidance.

DID YOU KNOW?

When someone passes away and you want to give money to a memorial fund, you can give it to AHSGR?

While this has the benefit of being used as a tax deduction (we are an Internal Revenue 504-3C organization) you can also earmark the donation for a specific area, i.e. SOARS project, the Foundation, etc., or just let AHSGR use it in the general fund.

A good example of this is the money donated in memory of Jim Hempel.

We had restricted funds in the budget of a little over \$1000 for landscaping. After getting three bids on what needed to be done, we were way short.

We remembered that Jim's memorial money had been set aside for an appropriate project and that \$600 was waiting to be used. I presented the landscaping plans to the Int'l Board of Directors, it was moved and seconded that we use

the memorial money, and a pledge was made to cover the difference that was left after the merger of funds.

Why use this money for landscaping? If you were ever down at the Heritage Center when Jim was alive, you know that he was there many times during the week, mowing, trimming, cleaning gutters, hanging pictures and quilt displays, and any other job that needed doing, as well as his own genealogy. So, as you can see, the landscaping project was a perfect place for his memorial. Now, we need a marker of some kind to dedicate the landscaping to him.
