think the following graph shows why we are concerned about getting new members into AHSGR.


Fortunately, the past several years have shown a flattening of the drop in membership and, hopefully, we can start an upward curve. BUT-that is not going

Special Memorial



The Lincoln Quilters



or the past 33 years, ladies of our Lincoln Chapter and their friends have met to quilt at the Heritage Center. Margaret Rob, mother of Mary Froscheiser and grandmother of Judy Runion, made the first quilt and through the years these ladies have made many beautiful quilts.

Every year these ladies make a special quilt for the Lincoln Chapter. A raffle is held, and this quilt is awarded to the lucky winner at our annual "Broda" dinner in November. The raffle this year raised \$693. Usually this money is donated to AHSGR for general use of the Society, but this year the Lincoln Chapter Board of Directors sought to honor these ladies in a special way. After consulting the quilters, the Board made a donation of \$307 and this, along with the \$693 raised from the guilt raffle, was donated to University of Nebraska Foundation for the International Quilt Study Center and Museum, now under construction at 33rd and Holdrege Streets. The new museum is scheduled to open in late March, 2008.

On May 7, 2007, Greg Jensen of the University Foundation came to the Heritage Cent to meet the quilters and received the gift.

Mr. Jensen spent over an hour with the quilters and told them that 117 architectural firms and individuals from all over the world expressed interest in doing the building design. The design that was submitted by Robert A. M. Stern, was selected.

The new International Quilt Study Center will be the only museum in the world fully dedicated to quilts. It will house over 2,500 pieces covering six centuries, including 1,400 quilts in the Robert and Ardis James Collection, which is presently housed in the Department of Clothing and Textiles building on the East Campus of UNL. Mr. Jensen said that historic American quilts, contemporary quilts, and "quilts from all over the planet," will be right here in Lincoln.

Mr Jensen said that one guild in France, when they learned of the

construction of the new quilt center, wrote that they are saving their money so they can all come to Lincoln, Nebraska, to see this unique facility and it's priceless collection.

This donation of \$1,000, in honor of our Lincoln Chapter quilters, will be recognized on the "Wall of Honor" where names of donor quilting quilds are listed on gold plaques.

Why did we give this money to the University of Nebraska Foundation for this project? The Lincoln Chapter board felt it was a fine way to honor the ladies who have made quilting a tradition in our Lincoln Chapter. They have raised thousands of dollars for our Society with their quilts. It will let all who visit the International Quilt Study Center in the future know that our Lincoln Chapter quilters have contributed much to the art of quilting.
