International Boards of Directors Meet at Heritage Center



The other member at the Fair was Erwin Ulmer. His gladiolas won the Blue Ribbon and the Purple Best of Show. Congratulations, Erwin!




Chapter Election of Officers



DEADLINE: ALL ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED BY April 15, 2008

If you are interested in entering AHSGR's Storytelling Contest, here is what we're looking for.... A good, interesting, unpublished story that pertains to the history, culture, folklore, language, or life experiences of the Germans from Russia.

Examples: • Memories of village life in the Old Country (festivals, foodways, visits by Gypsies)

- Stories about immigration to the New World (the great voyage, Ellis Island, early hardships)
- "Believe it or not" stories, ghost stories, humorous stories, inspiring stories, etc.

AHSGR STORYTELLING CONTEST RULES:

- 1) Each entry must be typewritten, double-spaced, and in clear, dark print. Entries must be on 8 ½ x 11" white paper. While a story can be only one or two pages long, no story can be longer than five typewritten pages, in standard 12 point type. Contestants may submit as many stories as they wish, but each entry must be separate and accompanied by a completed entry form. The entry form may be photocopied. Be sure to send FIVE COPIES OF EACH STORY and A COMPUTER DISK COPY IN RTF FORMAT (IF POSSIBLE), ANY PICTURES THAT WILL ENHANCE THE STORY, A SHORT BIOGRAPHY AND PICTURE OF YOURSELF, AND A SELF-ADDRESSED STAMPED POSTCARD, SO THAT WE CAN NOTIFY YOU OF RECEIPT.
- 2) The name of the author/submitter, should NOT appear on the story itself. Complete the form on reverse page and attach to your entry with a paper clip. Upon receipt, each story will be assigned a reference number (to assure fair and impartial judging).
- 3) Entrants who are 14 years old or younger must indicate their current age and their full birthdate (month/day/year). These individuals will be entered in the "Youth Division." All entrants 15 years old or older will be judged in the "Adult Division."
- 4) The title of the story (IN CAPS) should appear on the first page of each entry.
- 5) Each story must deal with some aspect of the Germans from Russia. To help put your story in context, you might want to begin with something like "This story is based on an actual incident that took place about 1890, in the Volga village of Straub. The story was often told by my grandfather who was born in Straub in 1875 and who immigrated to the United States in 1907."
- 6) If submitting a story in dialect German or Standard German, a full translation (in English) must be included. Both versions must still be within the 5 page limit.
- 7) Each entry must represent the story of the entrant. Contestants must verify this, as well as the copyright agreements on the front page with their signature.
- 8) Submitted copies of the story will not be returned. Future rights to the story will be as defined by the selected and signed copyright agreement on the front page.
- 9) All stories will be evaluated by a sub-committee of 3-4 AHSGR members. Entries will be evaluated using a score sheet and the final results will be announced at the upcoming AHSGR Convention. Three prize winners and one or more "Honorable Mention" winners are possible in both the Adult and the Youth Divisions.
- 10) All entries must be received by April 15, 2008. Entries received after that date cannot be considered.

The History and Origin of Veterans' Day

Several years ago, I tried to list in the newsletter, all of our people who went to war in World War II. It was to honor them for their service. Now, here we are again with Americans fighting and dying on foreign soil.

To all of our veterans, wherever and whenever you served, we thank you. To those now engaged in a war zone, may God bless you and keep you in the palm of His hand and bring you safely home.

(The following is from an Internet website.)

In 1918, on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day in the eleventh month, the world rejoiced and celebrated. After four years of bitter war, an armistice was signed. The "war to end all wars" was over.

November 11, 1919 was set aside as Armistice Day in the United States, to remember the sacrifices that men and women made during World War I in order to ensure a lasting peace. On Armistice Day, solders that survived the war marched in a parade through their hometowns. Politicians and veteran officers gave speeches and held ceremonies of thanks for the peace they had won.

Congress voted Armistice Day a federal holiday in 1938, twenty years after the war ended. But Americans realized that the previous war would not be the last one. World War II began the following year and nations great and small again participated in a bloody struggle. After the Second World War, Armistice Day continued to be observed on November 11.

In 1953 townspeople in Emporia, Kansas called the holiday Veterans' Day in gratitude to the veterans in their town. Soon after, Congress passed a bill introduced by a Kansas

congressman renaming the federal holiday to Veterans' Day.

The Uniforms Holiday Bill was signed on June 28, 1968, and was intended to insure three-day weekends for Federal employees by celebrating four national holidays on Mondays: Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Veterans Day, and Columbus Day. It was thought that

these extended weekends would encourage travel, recreational and cultural activities and stimulate greater industrial and commercial production. Many states did not agree with this decision and continued to celebrate the holidays on their original dates.

The first Veterans Day under the new law was observed with much confusion on October 25, 1971. It was quite apparent that the commemoration of this day was a matter of historic and patriotic significance to a great number of our citizens, and soon, on September 20, 1975, President Gerald Ford signed Public Law 94-97, which returned the annual observance of Veterans Day to its original date of November 11, begin-

ning in 1978. This action supported the desires of the overwhelming majority of state legislatures, all major veteran's service organizations and the American people.

After the United States' involvement in the Vietnam War, the emphasis on holiday activities has shifted. There are fewer military parades and ceremonies. Veterans

gather at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. to place gifts and stand quiet vigil at the names of their friends and relatives who fell in the Vietnam War. Families who have lost sons and daughters in wars turn their thoughts more toward peace and the avoidance of future wars.

Veterans of military service have organized support groups such as the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars. On Veterans' Day and Memorial Day, these

groups raise funds for their charitable activities by selling paper poppies made by disabled veterans. This bright red wildflower became a symbol of World War I after a bloody battle in a field of poppies called Flanders Field in Belgium.

Veterans' Day continues to be observed on November 11, regardless of what day of the week on which it falls. The restoration of the observance of Veterans' Day to November 11 not only preserves the historical significance of the date, but helps focus attention on the important purpose of Veterans' Day: A celebration to honor America's veterans for their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good.
