## The South Bottoms

The South Bottoms boundaries are, basically, "A" Street on the south, Ninth Street on the east, "F" Street on the north, and First Street on the west. (Some people will argue that Salt Creek is the west boundary.)

Just as there was a small grouping of GR's in Havelock, there also was a small grouping on West "A" Street. I'll not write about this grouping, except to tell you "Pop" Greenwald lived in this area. My friends and I spent a lot of time listening to his band at "Der Loaf and Stein" on "P" Street. Of course, being good German boys, we had to do what all good Germans do well, drink beer while listening to the music. But, I digress.

At the Heritage Center on a recent Saturday morning, we talked about the South Bottoms. By "we", I mean the group of men and, sometimes women, who gather for coffee, rolls, and conversation. That particular Saturday the group consisted of John Weber, Bill Amen, Phil Dinges, Bruce and Roger Trautwein, Scotty Kaufman, Erwin Ulmer and me. I was able to ask ques-

tions and gather more information about the South Bottoms.

We talked about some of the families of the area, like the Amens: Bill, Jim, Rudy, Frances, H.J., Jacob and Ruth.

We talked about the grocery stores that were in the area, and how the merchants would let the people buy on credit when times got hard. The stores that were remembered were Amen's Grocery on Second and "F" Streets, Dell's on "B" Street, Bernhardt's on "C" Street.

The grocery store on our campus really was a store, although it has changed in appearance over the years.

As we looked up at the Building Crew mugs, which hang above the sink in the snack area of the Heritage Center, we realized that almost of the names were South Bottoms families. Phil Dinges and Jake Sinner were the only ones from the North Bottoms. Most of Bud Dietrich's early years

were on a farm and the family didn't move into the South Bottoms until later.

Do you remember bread trucks and milk trucks that came into your South Bottoms neighborhood early in the morning? Omar Bread, Aunt Betty's

Bread, Roberts Dairy and Meadow Gold Dairy deliveries were good jobs for our hard-working people. Although I was pretty young, I do

Although I was pretty young, I do remember sitting on the steps of Adam Alles Drug Store. There were two gas pumps in front with glass tops. The glass had gallon increments marked on it and a handle to pump the gas up into the glass top. After you'd pumped the desired amount of gas into the top, you'd put the nozzle into your car's tank, open the nozzle and the gas flowed into your tank. I was probably about ten years old at the time, and, according to Google, the price of gas was 26 cents a gallon!

There would usually be some older men on the porch, chewing tobacco or smoking, and talking about the problems of the world, just like we do today.

The young boys chewed seeds and had hull-spitting contests. I can remember seeing Bud Dietrich and his grandson, Luke, sitting on the glider in front of Bud and Virginia's house and

Bud was teaching Luke how to chew "Rooshen peanuts" and then see who could spit the empty hulls the furthest.

I came to know that our people in the South Bottoms, and I suppose in the North Bottoms, too, had a lot of nicknames. There was "Moaner", "Gemar", "Ace", "Scotty", "Lefty", "Ears", "Spits", "Neighbor", "Whiz", and "Biff and "Boom". One nickname that really intrigued me is "Fat Frog".

I know how both John "Ducky" Weber and Don "Ducky" Schwartz, who was from the North Bottoms, got their nicknames. Do you?

Giving nicknames to our friends does not make our people unique, it just shows that people are the same all over.

As I looked up at the Building Crew mugs, I was stumped and had to ask what "Diffy" Froescheiser's real first name was. Following a few minutes of silence, someone said, "I think it was Alex." We all had a good laugh about that, but it does show how we get used to our nicknames.

Our conversation then turned to other names, such as, the Harris's, Don and Oleta Ernst, the Hergenraders, Pete Kaufman, and Scotty Kaufman. The Luft family at 125 "D" Street was where my mother lived. My Dad lured her away from the South Bottoms to the North Bottoms, where I was born at 7th and Vine Streets.

We talked about Roger Welsch, noted Nebraska historian, who lived at First and "E" Streets and about Ed and Sam Schwartzkopf and the Butherus's, the Millers, the Greens, the Kohlers, the Schneiders and "Ace" Dinges.

We talked of their accomplishments, their love of their heritage, and their deep religious beliefs. This conversation brought us to the churches; Ebenezer, St. Pauls, First German, Friedens and Zion. The parking at the churches was limited to curbside but the pews were usually full. Many people walked to church regardless of the weather.

As our generations grew from the first and second, church population

began to dwindle. The younger generations were moving outside of the Bottoms and driving to church became a necessity. Lack of parking caused some to start going to new churches.

As a general rule, one would find that there was usually one village that was predominant in the church; Balzar, Frank, Norka, etc. And sometimes feuds had something to do with who went to what church.

Our people did well in this great New World where they learned the English language in order to fit in and become Americans.

Although it had nothing to do with the South Bottoms, Erwin Ulmer and I started talking about another small enclave of GR's in the area from 14th to 17th and Vine. On the south side of the street there were a number of small houses that were GR families. There were some rental houses that were south of 14th and Vine. I remember those because Adam and Helen Loos, my godparents, had an apartment in one of them.


