I had to have femoral artery bypass surgery and the consequences of not having it done right away were too harsh to wait. So, on November 22, 2010, I had surgery at St. Elizabeth's. A week later I was transferred to Madonna Rehab Hospital where I had intensive physical therapy. Once I reached a lesser level of care and no longer needed the hospital setting, I was transferred to Tabitha where I received more physical therapy and was learning to walk again. After a couple setbacks, my legs had lost strength and I was not making any further progress as an inpatient so on April 16, I was discharged home where I received home health services and was able to start going to Madonna for outpatient physical and aqua therapy. I still

do not have enough strength in my legs to be able to stand but have an exercise program to do at home and am able to go to Madonna Pro-Active to work on some of the machines there.

The level of care I received at Madonna was nothing, if not, excellent. I was allowed to have the monthly poker game which five of my friends and I have been having for 30 some years. We even had a small group in for a New Year's Eve party in one of the meeting rooms.

And the caregivers at Tabitha were also excellent. They allowed me to have my men friends in for coffee and rolls, as is the usual occurrence every Wednesday morning at home. And one Saturday morning, the group who meet at Headquarters, came up for coffee and rolls, too.

The point I'm making is that the people who make these places work cannot be lauded enough. From the bottom of my little GR heart, Danke Schoen!

have asked in many newsletters for help from you, the members. The help I have asked for the most is a story or an article to put in the newsletters. Well, dear readers, I have two stories for you. I hope you enjoy them. I did.

Remembering the North Bottoms and GR Traditions by Joyce Riddle

I remember growing up in the North Bottoms of Lincoln. There was a close

camaraderie between the families of Germans that emigrated from Russia. Neighbors were very close, not only geographically, but also in friendship.

The houses were relatively small considering the size of most families. Most mothers were stay-at-home moms so closeness was the norm of the ladies via church activities and quilting "bees" which were held in different houses.

Weddings were the highlight of social events. About three or four weeks before the wedding took place; a

shower was given for the bride and was generally held at the "Welfare Hall" on North 10th Street. Bridal showers included between 100 to 150 guests, with sandwiches and dessert being served.

The weddings took place at one of the five Protestant churches in the North Bottoms and the receptions were always held at the "Welfare Hall." Most wedding receptions served roast beef dinners, with beer on tap, and

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were generally attended by between 300 and 500 people. Dinners were prepared by the mothers and served by young ladies who were friends of the family. Polka Bands provided the music and the receptions generally lasted 'til two or three in the morning. If you wanted to dance with the bride and groom, you had to pin money on their clothes (hence the term "pin money"). This was a fun tradition and helped the newlyweds start on their life together.

The close friendships created in this neighborhood lasted a lifetime for most people, whether they moved away or remained in the area. Some bonds remain even to the second and third generations.

I remember the Hock girls, Amy and Joyce, and their mother, Lena. They lived next door to my grandmother, Christina Schreiber-Schenkel-Kreick, who lived on the corner of 8th and Vine. I also remember watching Grandma and a host of ladies making quilts.

What I Did on My Summer Vacation by "Die Butzen" aka: Norma Somerheiser

This summer I volunteered as a docent at AHSGR Heritage Center. I went there once or twice a week and led visitors through the campus museum buildings. I did this so our staff would have fewer interruptions in their work day.

It was a learning experience for me, and I met many interesting and friendly people from all parts of the United States, and even a few from other countries.

There was a couple from western Washington who reminded me as we were leaving the summer kitchen, to be sure to "make the door shut." (Mach die Tier zu.)

On the Friday before the Washington/Nebraska football game, a father and his son from Bridgeport, Nebraska, came in dressed in their best Big Red shirts. The father wanted his son to see how his people lived when they first arrived in this country. The father made frequent comments about items he remembered; the cream separator, sausage stuffers, and the wash tubs used for Saturday night baths. When they left he thanked me for the memories their visit rekindled.

The Monday after the game, a lady and her husband arrived wearing their T shirts with big "W's" on the front and their Washington caps. When we were in the summer kitchen, I described the kitchen in the basement of my grandparent's home, which included a "fruit room." The man recalled memories of his grandmother's "fruit room." It was in the basement too. He said he was fascinated by the many colored cans of vegetables and fruits on the shelves there and if he was good he was allowed to choose the vegetable and fruit the family would eat at dinner that evening. His grandmother was Native American.

I asked these folks if they were enjoying their time in Lincoln. They said they went to as many Washington games as possible each year, and they had never been treated as well as they were being treated here. Lincoln people were friendly and helpful before, during, and after the game.

Twice I met people from New York. One lady from New York City knew about the Nebraskans living in New York who have Runzas and Valentino's pizza flown in from Lincoln.

Another couple from New York had not had a permanent address for the past ten years. They travel the country visiting places of interest and saw the Germans from Russia Museum sign on 9th or 10th Street and came to see what it was about. Neither of them had GR ancestry.

One couple from Colorado noticed

that the exhibit on working beets had a picture of the blocking and thinning process but had only beet knives in the exhibit. They said they would send me a short-handled beet hoe, and a few days later it arrived in the mail and is now at the Museum. It will be a welcome addition to our agriculture exhibits.

Many remembered growing up on farms. One item few forget is the cream separator, particularly cleaning it. One lady said if you did not get each of the disks perfectly clean, the next batch of milk would sour and her father would know who caused it.

Most of our visitors come because they have GR ancestors, a family member is or was a member of AHSGR, they were told about AHSGR by somebody, or they saw the signs on the streets and wondered what it was about.

Many say they had always wanted to see the museum but this was the first time they had time to come here. We often hear this from Lincoln people who are first-time visitors.

I learned a lot from our visitors and I encourage you, if you are not already doing so, to volunteer at the Heritage Center and lead tours. You don't have to be an expert on German or Russian history. Instruction is provided and many times the visitors will teach you.

Some of the comments you will always hear: "We did not expect to see this much here," "This is great," "This is wonderful," and "This is amazing." If they have GR ancestors, they express their gratitude that there is a place where our heritage is preserved and our story is still being told.

You will hear their stories, see smiles, and sometimes tears as the memories come, and you will be very proud of what the members of this society have done and are still doing to tell our story.


