# A Note from Larry...


ell, here we are again trying to put together a newsletter. We hope you will find it interesting and informative.

# Germans from Russia Contribution to the Beet Industry

his is a brief history of the Germans from Russia contribution to the beet industry in the Valley that appeared in the NE Panhandle Chapter Newsletter.

Sugar production in Nebraska began in 1890, with the first factory being established in Grand Island. The State of Nebraska offered a bounty of one cent per pound on sugar produced in Nebraska to encourage the industry to expand. Other factories were then built in Norfolk and Ames in 1891 and 1899.

Production began moving west to Scotts Bluff Co., due primarily to the development of irrigation and the expansion of the railroads through western Nebraska. By 1900, enough sugar beets had been raised in the Panhandle to convince the farmers that their land was suitable for this

crop. In 1909, land was acquired, a factory site was secured, and Great Western Sugar Co. bought the Ames factory and moved it to Scottsbluff. For the 1910 season, 12,000 acres were contracted at \$5 a ton and the factory was completed in time for the fall crop, beginning the foundation for sugar beets becoming the great agricultural industry it is today.

In order to fulfill the high potential for this area, efforts were made to recruit help from more experienced growers. It was at this time that the Germans from Russia (referred to as "beeters") from Lincoln and Omaha were enticed to come to the North Platte Valley. These workers first came to the Panhandle seasonally in the spring at planting, and returning in the fall after harvest. Their experience with sugar beets dated back to their

time in Europe, and was also essential in the initial efforts to produce beets in Nebraska.

By 1924, two-thirds of the beet workers in Scotts Bluff County were these German-Russians. As they became more Americanized, they began to find other jobs that would sustain them for the entire year, and their numbers decreased in the sugar beet fields. As the numbers of the German-Russian workers began to decline, much of the slack was taken up by Mexican and Japanese laborers. Many settled in the area, leasing farms, and buying land. Today, much of the farm land in Scotts Bluff County is owned by second and third generation descendants of the original German-Russian "beeters."

# Growing Up in the North Bottoms

s a child growing up on Claremont Street in the North Bottoms of Lincoln, one of our favorite places to play was at the Welfare House play area.

We lived at 1137 Claremont with our grandparents, John and Katherine Dellos.

Across Claremont Street it was still empty land. The newer homes had not yet been built. So we would go across and run through the tall grass to play on the slide, the merry-go-round and the swings. We spent many hours playing in our own private little park. The Welfare House was a fun place to be.

I loved the Welfare House Picnic every year with the cake walk, the grab bag booth. We always got little trinkets and small toys. We liked the running races and the shoe-kicking event. Also, all the pop you could drink and the watermelon feed. It was a day filled with enjoyment for young and old alike.

Then let's not forget the Christmas

Party, the big decorated Christmas tree upstairs along with the angel decorations hanging on the wall. And the arrival of Santa Claus! I always thought Santa was Jake Wyant? That is my guess?

Then we went downstairs to receive your Christmas sack of goodies; an apple, an orange, peanuts, and candy. All things we children loved.

Before the National Guard built all the buildings on 10th Street, there was a baseball diamond where the North Bottom guys played ball.

My neighbor-man, Bill Bauer, told me some stories about the games played there. One favorite of mine was The Harvard Baseball Team in Lincoln.

And somehow they played the North bottom guys on this field? And the North Bottom guys won? Does anyone else remember this event? I loved the story.

Bill's brother was a big athlete along with a Sauer from the North bottoms.

They were known at the University of Nebraska football as "Sauer and Bauer" both were top-notch athletes.

One other thing I remember about the land on 10th street was a billboard that said, "Sleep well tonight. Your National Guard is awake."

When we bought our house back on "Y" Street, one warm spring Saturday morning we were working in the yard when all of a sudden marching up 9th Street in full military dress was the National Guard Marching Band. They were practicing for some event. They stopped in front of our driveway and played for a few minutes, turned and marched back up 9th Street. It was awesome!

This is why I love my North Bottoms home; it sits in the best, most interesting part of Lincoln.



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
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
