Important Dates in the History of German Russians

he following list dates from Catherine the Great's birth in 1729 through 1804.

April 21, 1729...

Sophia Augusta Frederica of Anhalt-Zerbst was born in Germany. She later ruled Russia under the name Catherine II. (Catherine the Great)

1756-1763...

Seven Years' War. An important factor in bringing Germans to Lower Volga to establish colonies.

June 28, 1762...

Catherine II ascends the throne of Russia.

December 4, 1762...

First Manifesto issued by Catherine II, inviting foreigners to come to Russia. It brought few results.

July 22, 1763...

Catherine II issued second manifesto. It spelled out the conditions under

which they could immigrate and granted special right and privileges. Large numbers of German peasants accepted the invitation.

1764-1767...

Founding of German colonies along the Lower Volga River.

1771-1774...

Kirghiz Raids and Pugachev's rebellion, called the Pugachevshchina, ravished the Volga colonies.

1786...

Mennonites from West Prussia

began immigrating to Russia due to 1772 Partition of Poland, which threatened their military service exemption as conscientious objectors. Settlements were established primarily in the Taurida region of South Russia.

1793...

Second Partition of Poland grants area of Volhynia to Russia. Polish landowners invite German peasants to lease land for cultivation.

November 6, 1796...

Death of Catherine II at age sixty-seven.

1796-1801...

Reign of Czar Paul I, son of Catherine II.

1801-1825...

Reign of Tsar Alexander I, the well-beloved, grandson of Catherine II.

February 20, 1804...

Alexander I modifies and reissues manifesto of Catherine II, inviting foreigners to settle in New Russia.

DEADLINE: ALL ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED BY MARCH 1, 2014 Entries received after that date cannot be considered If you are interested in entering AHSGR's Storytelling Contest, here is what we're looking for.... A good, interesting, UNPUBLISHED story that pertains to the history, culture, folklore, language, or life experiences of the Germans from Russia. Examples:

- Memories of village life in the Old Country (festivals, foodways, visits by Gypsies)
- Stories about immigration to the New World (the great voyage, Ellis Island, early hardships)
- "Believe it or not" stories, ghost stories, humorous stories, inspiring stories, etc.

AHSGR STORYTELLING CONTEST RULES:

- 1) If submitting by mail, each entry must follow the following rules or it will be disqualified:
 - Five typewritten copies of your story, double-spaced, and in clear, dark print on 8½ x 11 inch white paper with one (1) inch margins in standard 12 point font/type. Include any pictures that enhance your story, a short biography, picture of yourself, and mail to:

- You may choose to submit your entry electronically in Word Perfect, MS-Word, or as a RTF document. Your story should be double-spaced, on 8½ x 11 inch white paper with one (1) inch margins in standard 12 point font/type. Attach any photos that would enhance your story. **Do not submit PDF documents.** Also attach a biography and photo of yourself. Send to Charlotte Lindsay at <<u>nashstreet@comcast.net</u>>
- No story can be longer than five (5) typewritten pages.
- Contestants may submit as many stories as they wish, but each entry must be separate and accompanied by a separate and completed entry form.
- If sending by mail, send five (5) printed copies of each story.
- Photos should be 300 dpi and unedited, and MUST be submitted as an electronic JPEG file.
- If original photos are not available in JPEG format it is the **AUTHOR'S** responsibility to have the photos scanned into a JPEG file, and assure that good quality photos can be reproduced/printed from the JPEG file.
- Do not send physical originals of photos, as they will not be returned.
- Receipt of your entry will be acknowledged via email.
- 2) The name of the author/submitter should **NOT** appear on the story itself. If submitting by mail, complete the form on reverse page and attach to your entry with a paper clip. Upon receipt, each story will be assigned a reference number (to assure fair and impartial judging).
- 3) Entrants who are 14 years old or younger must indicate their current age and their full birthdate (month/day/year). These individuals will be entered in the "Youth Division." All entrants 15 years old or older will be judged in the "Adult Division."
- 4) The title of the story should appear on the first page of each entry.
- 5) Each story must deal with some aspect of the Germans from Russia. To help put your story in context, you might want to begin with something like "This story is based on an actual incident that took place about 1890, in the Volga village of Straub. The story was often told by my grandfather who was born in Straub in 1875 and who immigrated to the United States in 1907."
- 6) If submitting a story in dialect German or Standard German, a full translation (in English) must be included. Both versions must still be within the 5-page limit.
- 7) Each entry must represent the story of/by the entrant.
- 8) Submitted copies of the story, photographs and other material will not be returned.
- 9) All stories will be evaluated by a sub-committee of 3-4 AHSGR members. Entries will be evaluated using a score sheet and the final results will be announced at the upcoming AHSGR Convention. Three prizewinners and one or more "Honorable Mention" winners are possible in both the Adult and the Youth Divisions.



Memories of the North Bottoms

cannot believe it is almost Thanksgiving. Growing up our family tradition was to have Thanksgiving and Christmas with my Dad's family. These were my grandparents, Henry and Katherine Bridegam. They lived in the South Bottoms at 1011 South 6th, right across the street from Cooper Park. We always called it "F" Street Park.

When we arrived at their home Grandpa Bridegam would greet us at the door. He always had on a white shirt and a tie and dress pants. His greeting to us was "Hi Ya, Hi Ya." We kids enjoyed that.

Dad had one sister, she was our Aunt Minnie. Her husband was Uncle Al, our cousins were Caroline and Roger. They lived on a farm near Wilbur.

They were always the last to arrive. When they did, Grandma, our mom Hilda, and Aunt Minnie would finish getting the meal prepared and put on the dining room table.

It was a feast consisting of the following courses; first was a green salad, then noodle soup, then the main course of either a turkey or a goose, also a beef roast which were always done to perfection. Along with the meats were mashed potatoes, dressing, sweet potatoes, corn, gravies, and the best hot rolls and rye bread, coffee for the adults and each of us kids had our own bottle of Dad's Root Beer served in a crystal glass.

Before the food was served Grandpa poured everyone a small glass of his homemade wine, either plum or cherry. It was very sweet and to this day if I have a glass of wine, it must be sweet like Mogen David. That is as close to Grandpa's wine as I can remember, [but not as good].

There was always a blessing of the food in German and, if you can imagine, there was still dessert to come! This was your choice of pies or a maraschino and black walnut cake that Aunt Minnie made. This was my favorite, as were her horn dinner rolls. Melt-in-your-mouth delicious!

We kids would run over to the park and play after we ate. When it was

time to go home Uncle Al would load up our family into his green Buick and drive us home as Dad did not drive a car until we kids were in Junior High. We walked or took a taxi or bus.

As you can tell meals at the family table were feasts.

When I was in senior high, I was invited to the Marine Corp Ball. I did not have a formal and had to borrow my cousin's. She was a tiny size 7 and I really needed a size 9. When we had Thanksgiving dinner, I literally only ate spoonfuls and prayed to get into that gown the next day. But I made it and had a wonderful night at the ball with my handsome Marine.

I loved having family in both the North and South Bottoms. Their German traditions and foods were both different and I loved them both.

Those were wonderful memories.

Thanks to Becky Schenaman, who still lives in the North Bottoms of Lincoln.


