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Growing up GR: Heroes

t this time of year when we honor our veterans, I think of a man who I never met but made the ultimate sacrifice to keep our country free. That man is my great uncle Jacob "Jake" Bauer of Lincoln, and one of the "sons" of Bauer and Sons Grocery at 402 "F" Street.

When the United States declared war on Germany during World War I (or what many of that generation always referred to as "The Great War"), Uncle Jake left his family and home to fight for his country.

During the same time, the world was about to be involved in another great fight not involving military weapons, but a virus – influenza. Influenza didn't care what your politics were, how old you were, or what your ethnic background was. It attacked everyone.

Beginning in January of 1918, the worldwide epidemic would claim around five percent of the planet's population, making it one of the worst natural disasters mankind has ever known. It is widely documented almost 100 years later that the most violent strain of the epidemic broke out simul-

taneously in three separate parts of the world; Freetown,

Sierra Leone; Boston, Massachusetts; and Brest, France.

Uncle Jake shipped off for war and right into the teeth of impending doom. His medical unit disembarked and was stationed at Brest, France. For eight weeks he took care of the wounded, sick, and dying there until he too, was stricken.

Uncle Jake's "official" cause of death was pneumonia but almost every belligerent country routinely falsified the causes of death on soldiers' records to try and quell the influenza panic at home. Uncle Jake almost undoubtedly died of influenza – a very gruesome and quick two-day ordeal where the patient literally suffocates to death. Two years later Uncle Jake was disinterred from France and brought home to rest at Wyuka Cemetery.

What I realize is that Uncle Jake didn't go overseas to give his life for Germany or for Russia. What I learned from his story is that although our ancestors may have come from that area long ago, when we step ashore here, we're not German, not

Russian (or any other nationality, either), we're all American. 🗖

My home in the North Bottoms was built in 1895. It was originally a horse barn. It does not have a basement so I cannot have duct work for a real furnace or central air conditioning. I love this home; it is just like it was when our German Russian ancestors arrived here.

Twelve years ago, I had a 12x12 log home built in my side yard beside the garage. I have so many people stop and want to know what I use it for. People who have traveled in Germany tell me it is very common there to have a small house built beside the original house. So I guess that was the German heritage in me coming out when I thought to have it built.

Right now my yard looks really nice. The grass is really green from all the rain and the roses are in full bloom. I am one of those people who mow their lawns at least twice a week sometimes three if it needs it.

I had two German men who owned houses across the street from me. One was Bill Bauer, the other was George Neiderhouse. They both kept impeccable yards. They liked me because I was just like them. As George used to say: "I was a very sensible girl."

When I would shovel my long driveway Bill would come over after he had shoveled his walks and he always brought his shovel to lean on and talk to me as I shoveled mine, but he never once lifted his shovel to help me!

He would just praise me for the good job I did. I sure miss all of my German neighbors.

Our North Bottoms neighborhood was a beautiful place then. With fall fast approaching it makes me think of how we would rake our leaves and I was the only one that George would let bring my leaves to his compost pile. He was composting and living green before it was fashionable. He still burned wood and coal into the 1980's when he died.

Our German people were wonderful neighbors and friends. I still take great pride in my home, neighborhood, and heritage.

NORTH POLE RESTRUCTURE

Twelve Days of Christmas



rom 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practice their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young Catholics. It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of their church. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality that the children could remember.

Who knew the partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ? Two turtle

doves were the Old and New Testaments. Three French hens stood for Faith, Hope, and Love. The four calling birds were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. The five golden rings recalled the Torah or Law, the first five books of the Old Testament. The Six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation. Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit, Prophesy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy. The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes. Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit—Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, Self Control. The ten lords a-leaping were the Ten Commandments. The eleven pipers piping were the eleven faithful disciples. The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed. □

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Silent Night

On Christmas Eve, 1818, the organ of St. Nicholas Church, Oberndorf, Austria, was in need of repair. Oberndorf was snowbound, and there was no repairman for miles around. Yet there must be some form of special music for the Christmas service. Franz Gruber, church organist, laid the matter before his friend Joseph Mohr, vicar of the church, suggesting that a new song might be helpful in the emergency. At this suggestion Mohr wrote the lovely verses of "Stille Nacht" ("Silent Night").

Gruber immediately composed the music for it and presented the new song at the Christmas Midnight Mass. It was sung in a three-part arrangement to the accompaniment of a guitar.

When the organ repairman arrived from Tyrol, a few days later, Gruber

showed him the new song. He was pleased with it and took it to a family in the Austrian Tyrol, who made extended concert tours and were famous for their singing of folk songs. Through this family, the song became known in Germany even before it was published.

In 1840, at Leipzig, it was printed as a "Tylrolean" Christmas song. In its travels about Germany, the song had lost the names of its composers. It was thought to be a folk song, and as such, no one suspected that the authorship could be determined. At one time the name of Michael Hayden (brother of the famous Franz Joseph) was

associated with the song as its composer. It has since b e e n

learned that he made a four-part arrangement of it.

It is only recently that the true story of "Silent Night" has become generally known. The first inquiry into the origin of the song was made in 1854 by musicians of the royal court in Berlin. Later investigations by Ludvig Erk and H. E. Zimmerman have thrown much light on the subject. Zimmerman in "The Homiletic Review" tells us that "the same inspiration which moved the priest seized the

> organist." One might think that some divine inspiration alone could make it possible to compose the words and music of such an immortal song in but a few hours. From the little hamlet of Oberndorf in Austria, the song has found its way into every hamlet of the Christian World. Zimmer-man says that it found its way across the ocean to America through a group of Tyrolean singers.

> Wherever this exquisite carol is sung, it awakens precious memories of childhood, of lighted Christmas trees in darkened churches and homes. The very simplicity of the song and the tranquil beauty of its music seem to breathe the atmosphere of the humble manger-birth. It has sung its way into the hearts of mankind, being now one of the universal favorites, and has been translated into no less than ninety different languages and dialects. \Box
