Germans from Russia Wedding Customs

t was a tradition for the young couple who were planning to marry, to choose two men to be their representatives, who went into the Volga River Valley to invite guests to their marriage ceremony.

These men carried with them a cane that the bride-to-be had tied a ribbon on. At each household, they recited a poem, which was really an invitation to the wedding. If the family tied a ribbon on the cane, it meant they were accepting the invitation. Weddings were looked forward to and eagerly attended.

The ceremony must be held in the wintertime, on a weekday, and not during Lent. Farm work was at its slowest season and there was ample time to prepare for it. A Dutch Hop was held after the wedding, and everyone loved dancing to the music played by a polka band.

The groom would tuck a flower in his left lapel and pin a long, wide ribbon under it. The light colored sash would drape down the entire length of the dark suit coat.

The bride would place a fancy handkerchief on her wedding gown, and as a man would dance with the new bride, they would pin money to the handkerchief.

The dance would go on until midnight, and then begin again the next morning, lasting for two days. \square

Grandma's Recipe for Doing Family Wash

(This is an authentic washday recipe in its original spelling as it was written out for a bride four generations ago.) Provided by Mrs. Gus Lebsack, Loveland, CO.

- Bild a fire in back yard to heet kettle of rain water
- Set tubs so smoke won't blow in eyes if wind is pert
- · Shave one hole cake lie soap in bilin water
- Sort things, make three piles, 1 pile white, 1 pile cullord, 1 pile work britches and rags
- Stur flour in cold water to smooth, then thin down with bilin water
- Rub dirty spots on board, scrub hard, then bile. Rub cullord but don't bile—just rench and starch
- Take white things out of kettle with broom stick handle, then rench, blew, and starch
- Spred tee towels on grass
- Hang old rags on fence
- Pore rench water on flower bed
- Scrub porch with hot soapy water
- Turn tubs upside down
- Go put on a cleen dress—smoth hair with side combs—brew cup of tea—set and rest and rock a spell and count blessins.



Sauerkraut Soup (From the kitchen of John Stuertz)

1 qt. sauerkraut, rinsed.

(Use the kind in the jar or plastic bag which can be found in the refrigerated section of the grocery. The kraut in the can leaves an odd flavor.)

- 1 lb. or more smoked German sausage, cut into 2 inch pieces or diced. (You may substitute any smoked sausage.)
- 3 or 4 potatoes, diced
- 3 qt. water
- 1 large onion, diced
- 1 stalk celery, optional

Bring water to a simmer; add potatoes, sauerkraut, sausage, onion and celery. Simmer for at least 3 hours.

Options: Liquid smoke can be added a drop or two to a bowl or it can be added during reduction/cooking time. Adding at reduction time will give the soup more depth. During reduction time, if soup becomes too thick, add some water. Soup may also be served with sour cream. (Originally this soup was made with beef bones or whatever beef cuts were available.)

Kase Verinik (from the kitchen of Nancy Hoppe, Northern Illinois Chapter)

Dough: 4 eggs

 $^{1\!\!/_{\!\! 2}}$ cup milk with a pinch of salt Flour- enough to make a stiff dough

Filling: 2 lbs. farmers or dry cottage cheese

2 tbsp. sugar 2 tbsp. flour

Pinch of salt

1/2 cup seedless yellow raisins

Mix together and add 2 tbsp. sour cream. Roll out dough and cut into 4 inch squares. Put filling on top and pinch corners together, seal edges making sure they are closed or filling will fall out.

Put into a kettle of boiling water for about 5 minutes, they will float to the top when done. Pour browned butter over the top. Note: Some Volga German cookbooks include ingredients other than raisins, such as onions and night shade berries.
