Put 1 cup flour into a bowl. Add: ½ tsp. salt ½ tsp. ground nutmeg 1 pinch white pepper

Mix together then make an indentation in the mix and add 2 well-beaten eggs and ¹/₄ cup of milk. Stir until smooth.

Boil 8 cups of water. Press the dough through a Spatzle maker or a large holed sieve or metal grater. Drop a few at a time into the simmering liquid. Some people like to use chicken broth.

Take the noodles out after about 4 minutes or at least 'til they come up to the surface. I use a slotted spoon to put them into a strainer then add finished noodles to a skillet heated with 2 tablespoons or more of butter. Brown lightly and sprinkle with 2 tablespoons of fresh chopped parsley. (I don't always add the parsley). Serve warm.

They can be kept in the refrigerator for a day or two before heating and serving.

Spatzle History-The first evidence of

Spatzle dates back to 1725. It is believed that they must be much older than this, but it is not known when and how Spatzle were invented. However, evidence shows that Spatzle used to be formed by hand or with a spoon into small pieces of dough. This version resembled a sparrow (Spatz) which is why they were called Spatzen.

Another theory states that the word Spatzle originated from the Italian word "spezzato" meaning "small pieces." It was the Swabian people that "Germanized" the word calling the noodle Spatzle.

AHSGR Convention 2015

Delores Schwartz and I left Saturday morning, July 11, about 7 a.m. for the 46th Annual International Convention of the American Historical Society of Germans from Russia which was held at the Holiday Inn Grand Montana in Billings, Montana July 13-18th. A trip of 925 miles.

The Convention was attended by over 300 people. The real work started on Sunday afternoon when the truck from Lincoln arrived with all the things needed to put this convention on; many hands made short work as the saying goes. Monday through Wednesday was filled with Society board meetings, but Registration, Heritage Hall, Library, Bookstore, Silent Auction, and vendors were all open for business.

There were four scheduled tours but one had to be canceled because not enough people were registered, but of the three remaining we heard nothing but rave reviews.

Each day the Hospitality Suite was open to volunteers and board members and we were treated to some very delicious treats. Fresh cinnamon rolls and cakes of different kinds, not a time to be on a diet....

Wednesday evening, before the Welcome Night festivities started, we were welcomed by a heavy rain shower as we crossed the parking lot to the Convention Center. Before the festivities started we enjoyed a sing-a-long led by Corinne Koehler and Don Shenk. The opening was given by Yellowstone Valley Chapter President, Sharon Hamill.

Thursday was the Opening Session with a welcome to the area being given

by Billings' Mayor Thomas Handel. Bob Wagner, Society President, presided over the business meeting. Staff and Society and Trustee Board members were introduced. Village Coordinators' meeting was in the later morning and the afternoon was filled with village area discussion group meetings. Each afternoon kuchen and coffee was served from 3:30 to 4 p.m. The evening program was a Memorial Service and Hymnfest led by Corinne Koehler, Don Shenk, and Dennis Reich.

Friday was filled with seminars, several of which Delores and I attended. I found the one on Adapting to the Cloud of Early-Onset Alzheimer's Disease or EOAD by Grant Jackson of West Yellowstone to very informative. Out of his family of ten only two have not shown any signs of the disease. His family was from the village of Walter.

The story-telling contest was held late Friday afternoon as was a Foundation Cocktail Party with speaker Dr. Russell Schnell. The Polka and More dance was played by "Just Jim and Friends." Fun was had by all that attended but Delores and I decided to forgo this since we were leaving early on Saturday morning to return home.

Saturday's agenda included the continuation of the seminars and the banquet dinner to close the convention. This included introduction of the new officers and Society and Foundation members. Distinguished Service Awards were given and our own Norma Somerheiser received one along with Leona Mann and Mabel Kissler. The film presentation of "We (Never) Don't Forget" by Dr. Eric Schmalz was shown.

Our Saturday was started by a stop at the battlefield of Custer's Last Stand. What an awesome feeling to be where history took place. We did not have time to take the tour bus and a guided tour but did do the 7.5 mile selfguided road tour with markers along the way to tell of what happened.

Our next stop was in Moorcroft, Wyoming to pick up a birthday present for Skip. Delores had found someone to make a metal figure of the Wyoming seal, the Bucking Bronco Rider. This was a 42" figure we fitted into the car with the rest of our belongings, then on to Casper for the night. It was a long, two-day trip, and we were glad to be home on Sunday evening. All in all it was a very good convention.
