George Neiderhause also knew neighborhood history. Once he told us our house, which was built in 1895, had originally been a horse barn and bachelor men rented space in it when they first came to America. I always liked that story. It helped me understand why we had no duct work for a furnace. I still have a gas heater.

Bill Bauer and his brother were famous football players at Lincoln High and UNL. My Dad and his cousins the Schwarzkophs also were into sports at Lincoln High. The Schwarzkophs played on UNL's 1949 Rose Bowl team. Oh, if this porch could talk, the stories it could tell.

One story George told me was when he was a boy. The "Rooshin" boys swam in the Salt Creek. One of the boys got in a deep spot and was struggling. Instead of saying "help" he shouted, "Save me, Save me, I'm my MaMa"s only boy"! Oh, how we all laughed. Those were the days!

The Recipe Corner

While looking for a nice spring salad recipe I found these two in the North Star Chapter's cook book entitled "Sei Unser Gast". They are just in time for the new radishes and onions, fresh from the garden.



Salat iz Radiska (Radish Salad)

The Russians often thicken sour cream dressings with mashed egg yolk, as in this radish salad, which would often be made with black- or white-skinned radishes.

Trim and wash 1 lb. radishes; drain. Slice, sprinkle with 1 tsp. salt, and let set for 30 minutes. Chop up the white of a hard-boiled egg and reserve. Mash the yolk and mix with 1/2 c. sour cream into a smooth dressing. Drain the radishes very well and dry; mix with the sour cream mixture and the chopped egg white. Season to taste with additional salt and pepper. Garnish with chopped chives, onion tops, or dillweed.

Creamed Onion Tops

Today we often throw away food our forefathers made good use of. Green onion tops are a case in point. Here's how the Ukrainians sometimes fix them: Cut green onion tops into one-inch pieces. Cover with sour cream, season with salt, and simmer until tender. Serve with new potatoes.

The thrifty German Russians also utilized green onion tops. Both the Black Sea and Volga Germans used the chopped tops to garnish German Russian Lettuce Salad. Some Wolgadeutsch families went a step further and made a salad from the tops alone by chopping them up, sprinkling them with salt, then mixing them with a generous amount of Sauermilich (clabber milk).
